Reading

Reading is a very high priority at LHPSN and books are at the heart of our curriculum. A child who reads and discusses books daily, increases their vocabulary by approximately five times compared to a child who does not.

Thank you for supporting your child by reading with them every day. It really is vital for their development in all areas.

Don't Forget Your Homework!

Reading - a minimum of three times a week read with your child, signature required on reading record books (KS1) record sheets (KS2).

Phonics and Spelling - daily practice, little and often Maths - To be super successful, children will need to have quick and accurate mental recall of number facts and bonds in KS1 and times tables and associated division facts for KS2.

Year 6 - preparation for the end of primary assessments SATs

Year 3 and 4- new statutory times table tests at the end of Year 4 up to 12x12

On the day of the final there will be performance coaching with the host and well- known poet, Spoz.

Nursey

Reception

Reception have loved learning all about penguins this week as we shared 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers. We talked about the different characters feelings as we recognised mental health week and finding your brave. We then explored how to look after ourselves if we are feeling worried and made our own worry dolls from the story Silly Billy.

YR1

In Year 1 the children have continued their work inspired by a lovely book, 'Where the Wild Things Are'. In English, they have been creating their own wild places, with the theme of fantasy islands. After labelling their own drawings with captions, they moved on to writing descriptive paragraphs. Even their science has taken on a 'Wild Things' theme, as they have been grouping animals.

YR2

Year 2 have carried on learning how pioneers have changed the world we now know. After studying Neil Armstrong's life, we discovered how Mary Annings's explorations along the Dorset coast completely changed our understanding of prehistoric life through the fossils she found. This week, we have been reading 'Malala's Magic Pencil' in which Malala Yousafzai described how she stood up to those preventing girls from going to school. We were really inspired by her words, "One child, one teacher, one book and one pen can change the world." We are wondering what sort of pioneers our children will be.

KS2

Year 3 have had a great start to the spring term, learning all about the Savage Stone Age! They have been creating some fantastic "woolly mammoth" shaped poetry in literacy, as well as interesting and informative non-chronological reports in groups, which they enjoyed sharing with the rest of the class. They have also created their own Stone Age cave drawings in art, using charcoal and oil pastels to depict a variety of Stone Age animals and hunting scenes. The children have recently tested out a Stone Age bread recipe making their own Stone Age loaves, although some were a little too crusty and Miss Smith and Mrs Cupper couldn't cut into them!

The children have built their own mini version of Stonehenge out of biscuits, which I'm sure was a lot easier and tastier to build than the real Stonehenge!

In maths they have been learning all about fractions, from adding and subtracting fractions, to using fraction walls to find equivalent and the simplest fractions. After half term we will be moving onto our next maths topic which is money.
